Obituary - Tom Deacon

Thomas Henry Tielding Deacon 11 February 1928 - 22 October 2009

Our President since 1992. Thomas Henry Fielding 'Tom' Deacon (1936-40) aged 84 died October 22nd at his home at Whiteshill surrounded by his family. He leaves his wife Dorothy, to whom he was married for 64 years, his son Roger, daughter Janette and four grandchildren. A long stay at Cirencester Hospital, a short home break then back to Gloucester Hospital with a heart problem. Only back home for four days and pneumonia finally took him from us.

Several old boys joined a packed congregation at the funeral service at St. Paul's. Whiteshill and our chaplain, the Revd Canon John Forryan, assisted and provided an excellent tribute to Tom'- (sadly abridged through lack of space – ed)

Tom presided over some 16 dinners in his long reign as president not to mention the numerous committee meetings, of which he was chairman. He was excellent in both roles and was a stickler for timekeeping and always kept a firm hold on matters if members tended to stray off the subject being discussed. In calling us to order at the Dinner he often brought the gavel down with such force that he made the pots rattle as well as us. Then there was the lovely occasion when he called for the Loyal Toast and continued with the words "Gentlemen you may smoke" although a large "NO SMOKING" sign was evident on the wall behind him Tom always looked forward to the Dinner and the meeting with old friends and it is sad that he has been denied this pleasure this year, although I know he will be with us in spirit. There are many other facets of Tom's life of which I knew little, but I do know that he will be sorely missed by all of us. At the same time I can say that we are all better people for having known him and thank God for his life.

Norman Francis 'Nobby' Hall (1943-47) of Ebley died December 9th aged 76. He was a member of our Committee since 1996 although poor health has not allowed him to attend meetings lately. Nobby had recovered from the leg ulcers that had troubled him but for three weeks prior to his death, he was treated for a chest infection until he fatally collapsed in the arms of his partner.
