Centenary Dinner

The Centenary Dinner was held at the Marquee, Whitminster Inn on Friday November 12th 2010. The decision to hold the event at larger premises than our usual 'home' was well-founded as we were able to welcome over 120 members amongst whom were many familiar faces and some for the first time. Guests of honour included Mike Workman, Tony Andrews and Dr. Stuart Wilson, Head teacher of Marling School.

Mike Workman entertained us with his memories of School in the early 1950s, a time when social attitudes were changing rapidly after the war, causing some consternation amongst the old guard of masters who found it difficult to deal with boys who persistently wore 'drainpipe' trousers and fluorescent socks.

Tony Andrews was in an anagrammatical frame of mind and invited us to notice that rearranging the letters, S.T.S.O.B.A. when writing cheques to the Association, the word 'BOASTS' can be formed. This reminded him that he was proud to have been associated with the School, first as a pupil and then as a long-serving member of staff both at the 'Tech' and at the combined School.
