Editorial

On the outbreak of the Great War he enlisted as a Private in the Gloucestershire Regiment, 1/5 Battalion (Territorial)

Sadly he was mortally wounded and died on 13th June 1915 in Flanders.

On a less sombre note, the last boy to be admitted in the 1964 intake was Martyn George Young of France Lynch. However, the very last entry of all was made on 27th April 1965 when Jeffrey Raymond Ballinger was enrolled after transferring from Gloucester Central Technical School. We should be interested to hear from them.

Her younger brother, Leonard Blandford, is 97 and was at the Boys' Central School from 1925 -27 leaving at the age of 14 years to start work at Holloway Brothers. Could Leonard be the Oldest Surviving Old Boy? His son, Graham Blandford, attended in the 1950's and, in all, 6 members of the family attended the School, the last member being Ian Angel before the Boys' Technical was merged with the Marling.'

News from New Zealand – Len Gaston writes:-

'We are still in the rental property but not for much longer. Should be on our way out in the first week of November and are quite looking forward to it. Health-wise we are both O.K. though Eileen is still suffering from the shingles. Still getting after shocks most days as many as three, don't feel them as much now as we have got used to them, most of them happen during the early morning hours and they do not wake us from our slumbers. Hard to think that the first earthquake was over a year ago (September 4th) and we haven't been paid out by the insurance co. for it yet. We have had three severe ones since then one on Boxing Day, the next on Feb 22nd and the last one in June since then it had been all after shocks. The city and suburbs is still in a mess, a lot of severely damaged buildings still standing waiting for their death knell and a lot of empty spaces where the occupants have met theirs. In the eastern suburbs where we live it is still in a mess. The roads are full of pot holes, a lot of road works are still in hand and some people are still not yet connected to the sewerage as the pipes are broken. It will be a year at least before it is all back together. The city council is planning for the cities rebuild but can't do anything until the buildings are down, meantime some enterprising businesses are opening shops made out of shipping containers. All in all things are extremely difficult as nowhere in the world has experienced so many earthquakes in so short a time and therefore our council has to learn how to manage things and under the circumstances are not doing too bad a job.'
